Beyond artistic skills, students gain an understanding of historical narratives, symbolism, and regional diversity through these traditions. Celebrations like Vyshyvanka Day and Malanka are not merely festive occasions but opportunities to instill national pride and cultural awareness in younger generations. They foster a sense of continuity with the past while adapting to contemporary cultural discourse, ensuring these traditions remain relevant in modern Ukrainian society. Additionally, participation in folk art activities

encourages creativity, community engagement, and an appreciation for the nation's intangible cultural heritage [4].

The Ukrainian education system, rooted in classical disciplines such as literature, mathematics, and the natural sciences, shares similarities with systems like that of the United States. However, it diverges in its limited emphasis on liberal arts, which are more prominent in Western education. The inclusion of Ukrainian and, increasingly, English in curricula signals a shift toward a more multicultural and multilingual society. Additionally, Ukraine is gradually embracing digital tools and international collaboration to modernize its educational practices. It reflects a commitment to aligning with global standards while preserving its unique cultural identity.

In contrast, the United States prioritizes flexibility and creativity in its education system, celebrating multiculturalism through programs highlighting diverse heritages [6]. Japan's system emphasizes self-discipline and respect, integrating cultural practices like calligraphy and tea ceremonies into its curriculum [5]. India balances spiritual and moral development with academic rigor, blending Vedic traditions with modern methodologies [3]. Meanwhile, Nordic nations are renowned for their progressive education systems, which focus on equality, sustainability, and experiential learning. These diverse approaches underscore the importance of cultural context in shaping educational practices.

Ukraine and other nations' cultural and educational traditions are vivid evidence of the diverse mosaic of human civilization, reflecting each society's unique histories, values, and aspirations [7, p. 24]. Ukraine's emphasis on folk art, communal values, and classical disciplines highlights its commitment to preserving its cultural identity while adapting to modern challenges. Similarly, the diverse approaches of countries like the United States, Japan, India, and the Nordic nations demonstrate how education can be shaped by cultural context yet still contribute to global progress.

Conclusion. Examining these traditions makes it clear that education is
